EXECUTIVE SECRETARY'S COLUMN

It took a small army of bandsmen a LONG time to collate, staple, coordinate, and stuff these packets and they could have easily left something out.

The second annual clinicconcert of the ATSSB All-State Band is successfully behind us and we are now in the process of preparing for the end of another year - and looking forward to another - hopefully more productive, more active and even more rewarding than the past one! I hope that each of your programs has benefited from ATSSB activities and hope that the coming years for ATSSB will do even more - in more varied ways - for your individual bandsmen. Some of the suggestions for ATSSB involvement have already been addressed and others are in the discussion stage.

Interesting fact about the 1993 All-State Band: the membership included 9 freshmen, 32 sophomores, 28 juniors, and 54 seniors.

The 1992-93 Membership Roster included with this mailing of the NEWSLETTER is intended for your use to keep in touch with each other. We can enjoy more success if we treat

our Association as a fraternity of brothers and sisters in the struggle to succeed in the small-school environment in Texas. Use it to suggest each other as judges for U.I.L. Concert and/or Sightreading Contests (the only way we are going to get more small-school directors on the list!), for clinicians, for judges of U.I.L. solo-ensemble contests, and as a source for information as you need it.

Interesting fact about the 1993 All-State Band: the 123 students were from 7 class A high schools (5% of the band), 27 class AA high schools (22% of the band), and 89 class AAA high schools (73% of the band). I was erroneous in the percentage of ATSSB members I gave at the General Membership Meeting in San Antonio (I read the wrong linet). Our membership breaks down as into 416 schools represented (with 493 paid members): 84 closs A (20.2% of the membership), 159 class AA (38.2% of the membership) and 173 class AAA (41.6% of the membership). These numbers might tell us some things about how we need to address the audition process in the future (or maybe the addition of a second band!).

We hope that the lighting in the Scottish Rite Auditorium was better this year for our student's eyes. We are continually trying to make the experience a rewarding one and are certainly open to your suggestions or comments regarding any aspect of our Association.

Interesting fact about the 1993 AllState Band: 30 students who made the
band as underclassmen last year made it
again this year, 56 students who made the
band last year as underclassmen did not
make it this year.

If you would like to pur-

chase a set of the music used on the concert (ATSSB had to buy it!), we will sell it to you at half price. We had to purchase two complete sets because of copy-"Standard of St. and/or right laws. George" (\$18.00), "Procession of the Nobles" (\$32.00), or Celebrations (\$80.00). Just call to let me know your interest and I will send it to you (if still available) with a bill. We still have a copy of last year's "Cajun Folk Songs" (\$47.50) and the march "British Eighth" (\$7.50) if anyone wants them.

Interesting facts about the 1993 All-State Band: Of the 123 members, each of the 20 regions had an average of 6.15 students in the band. One region had 15 (the most) and one region had none (the least). Each of the five Areas had an average of 24.6 in the band. Area A had 25, Area B had 24, Area C had 26, Area D had 25, and Area E had 23.

Interesting fact about the 1993 All-State Band: There were 7 students from 7 different class A schools, 27 students from 17 different class A schools and 89 students from 60 different class AAA schools. 58 schools had one student in the band. 19 schools had two students in the band. 4 schools had 3 students in the band. One school had 4, one had 5 and one had 6 students in the band. There were 84 different schools represented (compared with 77 last year). There were 70 females and 53 males in the band.

Elsewhere in the NEWS-**LETTER** you will find an order blank for an enamel ATSSB pin. The pins will be delivered to you with your membership card for 1993-94 or mailed directly to you if you order it but need to wait to renew your membership until the fall with the new school budget. There is also a form to order the 10" All-State patch (if your students has not already ordered it). The patch is also available to last year's All-State bandsmen (they were mailed a letter notifying them of the patch's availability).

A persistent rumor that we keep encountering is that ATSSB is a West-Texas organization. Let me assure you that our association is well-balanced with proportionate representation from across our large state:

If we break Texas into five geographical regions equalling our current five ATSSB Areas, we find that our total 1992-93 membership of 416 A, AA, and AAA high schools (with 493 directors as paid members) is divided as follows:

Area A (WEST TEXAS, Regions 1, 6, 16, 22): 18.27%

Area B (NORTH TEXAS, Regions 2, 3&20, 5): 21.39%

Aréa C (EAST TEXAS, Regions 4, 10, 17&19, 21): 22.26%

Area D (CENTRAL TEXAS, Regions 7,8,9, 18): 21.15%

Area E (SOUTH TEXAS, Regions 11, 12, 13, 14, 15): 16.83%

We can also break the state into three geographical parts with the following results:

WEST TEXAS (Regions 1, 2, 6, 7, 16, 22): 33.894%

SOUTH TEXAS (Regions 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 17&19): 24.481%

EAST TEXAS (Regions 3&20, 4, 5, 8, 10, 21): 40.625%

I know he will serve you well as a member of the Executive Committee. I commend the regions for their nominations for thest state offices. I would also like to thank all of you who volunteered your time and energy to keep ATSSB energetic and meaningful. FROM THE PRESIDENT PROPOSED AGENDA ITEMS FOR THE STATE BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

These items will be discussed at your Region Meeting by your Region Coordinator

I. Constitution Changes

A. Change active membership to include Junior High and Middle School Directors who feed A, AA, AAA High Schools.

Article III

Active - A current director, assistant director of a class A, AA, AAA High School or a current director of a Junior High/Middle School whose students feed a class A, AA, AAA High School in Texas as defined by the University Interscholastic League.

B. Change the office of Vice-President to President Elect with no change in duties

Article V

The President Elect shall assume office in the manner prescribed in the bylaws. The President Elect shall be an active member. The President Elect shall be in charge of formulating, editing, printing and distributing the ATSSB NEWSLETTER, the official publication of the Association.

C. Add to the State Government an At-Large representative for each High School classification elected by those members of that class.

Article V - Section 5

One active member from each High School Class (A, AA, AAA) shall be elected by the members who are directors in that class to serve as an At-Large Representative of that class to the State Board.

By-Laws

The At-Large Representative shall serve a two year term. The term shall begin immediately upon election and last until a successor is elected. The general membership of each class shall elect an At-Large Representative for that class to serve on the State Board. This election shall be held in even numbered years.

 - b. Take one instrument from each area who now tape (5 oboes, 5 bassoons, 5 alto clarinets, 5 contra-clarinets, 5 tenor saxes, 5 bars saxes, 5 bass trombones, 5 mallets 5 timpani) to be included in the ATSSB All-State Band
- Take 2 to All-State of those instruments where only 1 from each area is selected (bass clarinet, alto sax, cuphonium, snare)
- 8. All-State Jazz Group

PRIVATE LESSON ALTERNATIVE

One of the major problems of the small school bands is the availability of private lessons. I have taught in small schools for 23 years and know that even if a student desires private lessons, distance is usually a problem. Having to deal with this I decided many years ago that I had to be the "private" teacher for the majority of my students. Since I was not a master of all the instruments, I decided that I had to have a plan. A dear friend, teacher, and colleague of mine, Jim Hudgins, suggested that I use the Prescott outlines in order to gauge my students' progress. Using the Prescott Technique System outlines I have developed a system for gauging student progress, motivation, and chair seating.

A problem that I used to face was where to start teaching a student when he came for help. I usually started with some exercises or songs on which he was working. These were usually

confined to All-Region tryouts or songs that the band was playing. We usually reached a road block because the student was deficient in some fundamental. After beginning the use of the Prescott system I found myself finding solutions for fundamental mistakes in the outlines. After the students work on their outlines for an extended time, they begin to make less and less fundamental mistakes. They also know where to go to work on particular skills to play difficult literature.

Since they are following an outline, I can readily check their progress at any time. I can tell if they have worked during any particular period of time. This is valuable when it comes time for grades to be reported. This progress on the outline gives a basis on which to justify a grade. Some directors like to give awards for students who work extra hard. This outline helps determine who is or isn't practicing. By looking at a student's outline, I can tell if he is progressing fast, average or slow.

I use the Prescott outline as a motivational tool. Each time a student plays off an exercise he gains the reward of seeing it checked off and is motivated to do more. Students are natural competitors. They take pride in the fact that they have played off 4 weeks, or 6 weeks, or two years of Prescott (four years are currently published). Every student that I have taught that has played off at least one year of Prescott (knock on wood) has made the TMEA All-Region Band either

in Jr. High or in High School. That's powerful. It seems that always have several students trying to out do each other by playing off more Prescott.

A great spin off of this method is chair seating. I do not have any chair challenges to judge. Each section is scated by the amount of Prescott played off. This works quite well. Although with this seating system the one who works hardest sits first, the is about 99% of the time the best player. When a new student moves in, they begin to play off Prescott very quickly until they reach their level of proficiency. At that point they begin to learn new skills. It does not take long to find out how will they play and where they belong in the section.

How does it work?

At first this seems like the director will be doing a lot of listening from all of his students. That is true but it doesn't have to be. I use what I call the BOARD OF EXAMINERS. These are students that I have chosen who may listen and check off other students. I allow an All-Region student to listen to anyone in the band regardless of what instrument either play. If there are not may All-Region students in the band, I will choose the better students in each section for the BOARD. In this case, this student may only listen to others in his own section and only exercises that he has actually played off himself. By using the board I have greatly reduced the load on

found one instance where the student on the board was too easy on a friend. The students are usually a little harder than me. Does it work? Yes!!!! I have always heard the teacher learns more than the student. By having students teaching (checking off) other students they both learn. When can all of this checking off take place? In Warren I do it before school, during breaks, at lunch, after school, and any time the student is able to come to the band room. Some students check off at home to neighbors or brothers or sisters. At times I have allowed student to listen to other students during the band period.

METHOD

The Prescott Technique System was originated as a private lesson method. On the outline a particular exercise may be repeated several times. Once played off I line through the remaining repeats of the exercise. This way the student only plays any given exercise one time. I require that the students follow the outline by the weeks for chair seating. My experience is that if the student does not skip around the outline, he will progress faster in the long run. In the Junior High I only use the Prescott system for chair seating. When they come to High School I require a number of Prescott exercises to be played off each grading period. There are alternatives however. During marching season for instance, they may substitute marching

myself. In doing this I have only a music playoffs for Prescott by assigning a value in Prescott exercises for each marching song. In the same manner substitutes can be made for All-Region, 1st divisions at Solo & Ensemble, etc. Therefore in High School grades are partially based on Prescott or their substitute. In a time when documentation is becoming more and more important the Prescott system proves very beneficial.

I might add that - since I started this system (for than 15 years ago, that have had at least one and many times 3 or 4 students advance to TMEA Area (one actually made TMEA All-State). Last year in the first year of ATSSB, I had 13 All-Region students, 7 Area, and 3 All-State (2 of which were 1st chair). In addition to that one student chose to attend the TMEA Area. Prescott works for me!
