Congrats to the 2019 All-State Jazz Band! The concert was the strongest it's been in years! Our clinician had many fine things to say about our students and directors.



The music set for year D is ready to ship. To order music, CD, see cuts, listen to demos, etc., go to www.matteimusicervices.com

1. There are no changes on **Cuban Fire Ant... Sweet!** or **Sink or Swing**.
2. On **Just Ahead** (ballad), drummers will play brushes instead of vibes. The vibes requirement has been dropped by ATSSB. Drums play from beginning to 5, then 13 to the end. Melodic instruments play from beginning to end of measure 4, then measure 13 to the end (the pickups to measure 13 are the same as in measure 4). 3. **C Modal Blues** (improv) – play first 4 measures, then measure 29 to the end. Cuts are noted on the printed score and all parts. DEMO at www.matteimusicervices.com/atssb-changes-1

It would be best to buy an updated CD! The print music is the same, but the CD accompaniment tracks have been edited to reflect the changes.

Prior to serving as an All-State Band Organizer, I had no idea what it took to prepare for the All-State clinic rehearsals and concerts. Since becoming an organizer, my eyes have been opened to the numerous procedures in place to guarantee a smooth and enjoyable experience for the All-State Band students each year.

Executive Secretary's Column

Another successful ATSSB All-State experience - our 28th! The success, of course, is attributed to the many individuals working behind the scenes to put it all together. I will try to mention all I can in the following paragraphs.



TMEA once again housed the ATSSB All-State students and their chaperones in the Hyatt Regency Hotel. We had student registration in the Hyatt Regency again this year so you did not have to run over to the Convention Center just to get their badges - then run back to the Hyatt Regency for the student meeting prior to chair auditions. We also started chair auditions an hour earlier than usual to give the students time to get a bite to eat before the evening rehearsal. It seemed to go smoothly - and we actually distributed every badge to every student. In the future, if you need to book an early arrival on Tuesday or late departure on Sunday, try to use another hotel for those stays and book the Hyatt Regency for the three nights of the clinic if you want your students in the same hotel as rehearsals (just a suggestion - some of you may have been able to secure the Hyatt Regency for all of the nights you needed).

Thanks go to the dedicated leadership of TMEA: TMEA Executive Director Robert Floyd, TMEA Deputy Director Frank Coachman, Andrew Denman, Kay Vanlandingham, Tesa Harding, Karen Cross, and the rest of the TMEA staff for their help and cooperation over the years.

Interesting fact about the 2019 All-State Bands: The membership included 22 freshmen (up 9 from last year), 44 sophomores (same as last year), 85 juniors (down 12 from last year), and 149 seniors (up 4 from last year).

THANK YOU - Eric Gray from Gilmer and his crew did another great job with State Chair Auditions. It is no small task assembling all of those panels of volunteer judges and screens and the forms and pencils necessary and the computers and printers and food for judges and workers. Thanks again, Eric, for all of your hard work and that of the Gilmer staff, and to Collin Anderson and his staff from Groesbeck for serving in the Auditions Office - working the computers and checking all that math (then his staff attended each concert to take up all-state music folders so they could be sorted and placed in the ATSSB All-State Music and Lending Library Groesbeck hosts). And thanks to all of the directors who volunteered their time to sit on judging panels, monitor, run errands, etc., to make the auditions run smoothly, and then even more who gave up their evening to attend the organizational rehearsals then meet with the clinicians to decide what to work on as section teachers the next morning (they are named and thanked elsewhere in this newsletter). Mark Conaway from Sunnyvale, Brian Sours from Tenaha, Justin Wallis from Anna, and Luis Zepeda from London had to give up most of their convention to serve as Band Organizers as did Curtis McCarthy from Anna and Brian Straw from Henderson as Percussion Organizers. We would be remiss in not thanking TMEA for including ATSSB in the percussion provision rotation. Rehearsal and performance percussion equipment were provided by provided by Ludwig-Musser, a division of Conn-Selmer, Sabian Cymbals of Canada, and Gon Bops, in cooperation with Brook Mays Music / H&H Music

and Lone Star Percussion. Pianos were provided by Steinway & Sons. Digital keyboards were provided by Yamaha Corporation of America. Conductor podiums, conductor stands and conductor chairs were provided by Melhart Music Center.

Interesting facts about the 2019 All-State Bands: Argyle, Canyon and Grulla each had 11 students make All-State; Fredericksburg had 9 students make All-State; Hidalgo had 6 make All-State; Canton, Hondo and Stephenville each had 4 students make All-State; sixteen schools had 3 students make All-State; forty-four schools had 2 students make All-State; and one hundred four schools had 1 student make All-State. In all, 172 different schools were represented in the ATSSB All-State Bands.

OPS - The Outstanding Performance Series was once again a great success in 2018 and the beautiful award the winners received in the General Session on Thursday is an enviable trophy to be seen in band halls across the state. The runner-up plaque was beautiful also, befitting the great honor these bands received from their peers. Congratulations to the winners and runners-up. I look forward to this year's competition and hope many of you enter your band's performance(s) from a contest this year. This will be the second year OPS will be entirely digital, so be sure to read Collin Anderson's OPS article carefully regarding the digital process. This next September will also be a first - we will no longer produce and ship a CD with the September Newsletter. Every member of ATSSB will receive a link to secure a PDD (permanent digital download) of the winning selections in the 2019 Outstanding Performance Series.

DIRECTORY - An ATSSB Membership Directory is available on the Website (in the left hand column of the opening page, go down to DIRECTORY and click on it). You will need your last name and ATSSB number with no letters to access the Directory. It lists all those who are Active and Current for the fiscal year (which ends July 31). Since the State Board has voted that the ATSSB Website is the official document, we no longer print the Directory (or anything else) for mailout. All documents must be viewed/printed/downloaded from the Website. You will now need your last name and ATSSB ID (your ATSSB number without the letters). We secured the Directory because advertisers were mining the contact data and besieging our members with advertisements.

Interesting facts about the 2019 All-State Band: The band had 121 females and 179 males.

APPLICATION - There is a Membership Application in this Newsletter and on the Website that you can download and use or give to your assistants or to share with neighbors. Membership renewal reminders are not sent, so use the one available online or linked here to join as soon as you can in the new budget year (although we surely do appreciate all of the scholarship contributions you make when you join after October 1!). There is also a College Division Membership application available here and online. Give one to your senior bandsmen that might be considering music as a major or minor in college. Remember that dues are \$50. The \$25 late fee will continue to be added after October 1, so if you want to avoid the late fee, get your dues paid as soon as possible (you can use a school PO at any time, a check or money order or your credit card online).

PAL - The Prescribed Audition List includes all known (and SARC-approved) errata to date on each of the etude pages. The scales are up to date on the website, including the State Board mandated statement that

scales are to be played "as written" - so be careful your students play a whole note at the end of each scale. Be sure you are using the current data from the Website since an Update will not be mailed or passed out at TBA like we used to do (remember that the Website is the official document). We will be using YEAR D in the PAL for auditions in 2019-20. Watch the Website for the Year D Update - and remember that percussion auditions are unified. Links will be updated as they become available.

Interesting facts about the 2019 All-State Bands: Of the 300 students in the bands, 7 were from class 1A schools (3.33% - down from 9 last year), 28 were from class 2A schools (9.33% - up from 23 last year), 93 from class 3A schools (32.33% - down from 97 last year), and 172 from class 4A schools (57.33% - up from 170 last year).

The audio recording of each of the All-State Band concerts is available on compact disc from Probst Audio (see order form in this Newsletter). Mark Custom Recording did not make a DVD this year of the Jazz Ensemble due to copyright issues on most of the pieces performed but the All-State Bands are available on DVD from them. You may still order plaques and t-shirts from the event through Pepwear. You may also order the large 10" All-State patch from this office (\$10 each includes shipping). Use the order forms in this Newsletter or online to get yours today.

Use your contacts at colleges and universities across Texas (and beyond) to make sure that they give scholarships (all expenses paid) to ATSSB All-State students and tuition scholarships to ATSSB Area students for their summer band camps like some colleges do. Check out what the camp offers and then encourage your students to go where they are wanted. Several colleges have already contacted me wanting the All-State list so our students can be contacted about scholarship opportunities. More and more colleges are interested in our seniors each year.

Interesting facts about the 2019 All-State Bands: Of the 300 members, each of the 22 regions had an average of 13.63 students in the band. Two regions had 24 (the most) and one region had three (the least).

Remember that Region Officers serve a two-year term, so if elections need to be held in your regions, go through the process in place to elect them. Be sure to let me know if you replace a Region Coordinator for 2019-20 in your Spring Meeting. I need to have their name as soon as possible for our plans for 2019-20 (call me at 713-874-1151 and leave a message). Your Region Coordinator is your region's representative on the State Board of Directors which makes all of the decisions for you regarding ATSSB matters. Make sure he/she or a proxy attends each SBOD meeting. It would also be nice if each Region Coordinator brought a mandate of opinion from region members so votes could be representative of each region of the state. It would also help if each region kept their region webpage on the ATSSB website updated. Keep an eye on your region's page and volunteer to help keep it up to date if you are into web publishing and would like to help. The ATSSB State Board will send each Region a Fall Agenda, listing items each Region needs to address, so watch for those items.

Also, Ander Castaneda (Fredericksburg Jazz Trombone) and Mario Hernandez (Crane 3A Trombone) each received the \$500 ATSSB All-State Band Scholarship for making the band their freshman, sophomore and junior years (but were eliminated at Area their senior year).

Seniors Itzhak Corona (Grulla 4A Tuba), Jakari Holland (Liberty-Eylau 4A Tuba), Yuvia Leon (Athens 4A Flute), Audrey Livingston (Argyle 4A Flute), Hailey Sherrill (Smithville 4A French Horn), Ansun Sujoe (Bethesda Christian School Bassoon), and Elyana Williams (West Rusk 3A French Horn) each received the \$2000 ATSSB All-State Band Scholarship for making the band all four of their years in high school.

These senior scholarship recipients were given a plaque in a brief ceremony between the performances of the Concert and Symphonic Bands. This makes one hundred twenty-two students who have received the four-year scholarship (the first twenty-three received a \$1000 scholarship until 2003 when the three-year \$500 scholarships were started and the four-year award was raised to \$2000) and three hundred twenty-three who have received the three-year scholarship (this is the fourteenth year for the three-year scholarship to be given). Since 1992, \$371,500 in scholarships have been awarded to 445 individuals (6.7% of those selected to ATSSB All-State have received a scholarship).

Interesting facts about the 2019 ATSSB All-State Band: Over the last twenty-eight years, 6,641 students have been awarded All-State honors by ATSSB.

My thanks to all of you for what you have done to make ATSSB what it is today.

4A Representative's Column

In the media today, we are seeing more than ever the practice of putting op-ed stories out there that we as consumers pick and choose from. We choose stories that agree with an opinion we also have on a particular subject. Some may disagree that they are not op-ed stories, that they are facts, but many times we do not have a firsthand account of “the facts,” so we are left with picking and choosing which media outlet we want to believe.

Your question may be at this point, what does this have to do with music and education? There are two things in this scenario that can either help you as a teacher or hurt you: (1) circumstantial bias and (2) unknown facts.

Circumstantial bias happens every day to everyone. This is when we pick and choose events that fit the beliefs we already have. As humans we want to believe what we think is correct, so we ignore some things and believe only the facts that fit our predetermined belief, be it about the Texas legislature’s funding education, local school administration, parents, or even students.

I encourage you to think about a student who you consider to be a disruption or an unmotivated player. How often do we just pass over this student? Why is the only thing we ever say to them is something negative about their behavior or playing? How difficult is it to actually find something good to say about them or find a positive way to help them? For me, this is VERY hard at times. I am constantly tracking what I say and how I say it. I try, whether in class or out of class, to find a way to genuinely say something positive and encouraging to those students so that they hear something different from me. No matter what this student does, or what chance they are given, we sometimes have an opinion of them and stick to it no matter what the student does.

Now think through this backwards, from other people towards you. What about from the student’s perspective? Do students (administrators, parents, community) develop a circumstantial bias towards teachers? Yes, they do. Are you aware of it? What are the feelings or thoughts they have? If their feelings are not helpful to you or your program, what can you do to overcome them? With students, this may be very challenging. Students may get a negative opinion of a teacher and then by gossiping with other students, a popular false opinion forms. This can make rehearsals and trips very challenging. With genuine kindness and creativity, you can turn this around. Don’t draw attention to it or make it obvious, but most of the time, over a long period of time of doing small things that are the opposite of the opinion the students, the narrative will change.

The relationship we have with our students needs to be one of care, compassion and correction. Without the first two (care & compassion), you cannot do the third (correction). So stop and think through a student’s eyes before jumping to correction. In a relationship, circumstantial bias can be completely based on wrong information or the causality of several wrong events, giving way to formulating a completely untrue opinion.

Unknown facts also get me in trouble and feeling bad about what I say or do with students. We as teachers do not always know what is going on in a student’s life. This scenario, I’ll bet, is very well known to all of us. We get onto a student for a behavior or we have a student acting out in an unacceptable way, so we have to address it. Little do we know all the details of what is going on, and we find out later that there has been something very tragic that has caused this behavior. Then we feel like a heel We all know this situation, and I would bet most of us have been through it. BUT what I want you to consider is that the student has not been taught how to cope with the situation correctly. Yes, you rushed to judgement and made a bad situation worse, and even though that certainly needs to be addressed, I truly believe that what is missing with many students is coping skills--how to deal with failure, the loss of something or someone, not getting your way, being treated unfairly. The skills or character traits to help deal with these types of situations are not being taught. So when you mess up next time, admit it to the student and apologize. Then at some later point, help the student develop the skill and appropriate behavior when dealing with the problems that caused the situation. Show you care about their future and their maturity.

This is just some food for thought on dealing with midyear stress and with teaching students. We always joke here at North Lamar that a psychology degree would be more helpful than a music degree.

As we all gear up for this spring's Outstanding Performance Series competition, there are many aspects that were new last year and may need some clarification for those of you who are more accustomed to older method of entry.



All of the following instructions/information will also be on the ATSSB OPS Webpage:

- Entry deadline is Saturday, May 25 by midnight.
- Entries will be certified to Area by midnight on Saturday, June 8.
- Entries will be certified to State by midnight on Saturday, June 22.
- State adjudication will be July 25 at the TBA convention in San Antonio.

A matrix of which regions and areas will be judging others will also be posted on the webpage.

Read carefully to better understand the entry process:

1. Create .WAV files of each piece you plan to enter. Any multi-movement work should be in one .WAV file.
2. Name the .WAV file correctly, in the right format!!! This is imperative to keep all the files sorted into the correct classes and regions/areas for adjudication. Include NV after the school name for non-varsity entries.

4. Send the OPS Verification Form and your entry check to Kenneth Griffin.

A Certification of Advancement form will be emailed by the OPS State Chair following each level of adjudication to show which entries advanced from region to area and then to the state OPS contest.

Minutes of the February ATSSB General Session

The General Session of ATSSB met in CC225 on Friday, February 15, 2019, with approximately 220 in attendance. President Mike Bartley called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m.

Eric Gray from Gilmer gave the invocation.

Mr. Bartley introduced the head table: himself, Executive Secretary Kenneth Griffin, President-Elect Eric Gray, Class 3A Representative Angie Liss, Class 2C Representative Christina Smith, Class 1C Representative Marilyn Bennett, and Class 1A/2A Representative Mike Glaze.

Mr. Bartley then introduced the candidates for the office of Class 1C Representative to the State Board of Directors: Marilyn Bennet from Olnier MS, Julie Cook from Howe MS, Shannon Landrum from Tgenaha MS, Gina Muela from Littlefield MS, and Dean Webber from Canadian MS. He asked for nominations from the floor and, hearing none, Mike Bartley spoke for Marilyn Bennett, Angie Liss spoke for Julie Cook, Christina Smith spoke for Shannon Landrum, Richard Herrera spoke for Gina Muela, and Dean Webber spoke for himself.

He then introduced candidates for the office of Class 3A Representative to the State Board of Directors: Stephen Cox from Eastland HS, Angie Liss from Howe HS, Brad Long from Kountze HS, Cari Martin from Teague HS, and Jennifer Webber from Canadian HS. He asked for nominations from the floor and, hearing none, Jett Lowrance spoke for Stephen Cox, Jason Matherly spoke for Angie Liss, Dr. Scott Depp spoke for Brad Long, Collin Anderson spoke for Cari Martin, and Jennifer Webber spoke for herself.

Mr. Bartley then introduced candidates for the office of President-elect: Rodney Bennett from Olney and Matt Knight from Abernathy. He asked for nominations from the floor and, hearing none, Michael Childs spoke for Rodney Bennett and Mike Glaze spoke for Matt Knight.

Ballots were then cast and collected by the election committee chaired by Jenny Bartley.

The minutes of the General Session July 27, 2018, were approved as printed in the September Newsletter after a motion by Kyle White from Grand Saline and a second by Rodney Bennett from Olney.

Mr. Bartley noted that Ann Lowes Mueller, new Composition Competition Coordinator, had no report but was preparing for the 2020 Competition for which there were no entries as yet.

In the SARC report, Eric Gray thanked his committee: Chans Mollendorf, Coral Rios, Jason Yountz, Jason Jones, Jerry Whorton, Evan Fletcher, and Zach Simms. He then reported motions from the committee approved by the State Board:

Changed the 20-second warmup times in State Chair Auditions to 30 seconds to align with Region and Area auditions.

Amended timpani tuning rules to state that only non—electronic sources audible to the judges may be used in the audition room.

Added errata to Year C Tenor Trombone.

Authorized the State Jazz Coordinator to update the Jazz Audition Instruction Sheets to be Year specific.

State Jazz Coordinator Brian Donnell noted that this next year will be SET D. Buddy Mattei will have the accompaniment CDs ready for sale by March 1 and there are length changes in one etude that is reflected in the new CD. Mr. Donnell recommended directors get a new one. Region Coordinators will be given the CD accompaniment at TBA.

A runoff ballot was distributed to vote on Class 3A Representative between Angie Liss and Jennifer Webber.

OPS State Chair Collin Anderson presented the 2018 OPS winners and runners-up with their awards.

In the President's Report, Mr. Bartley noted that OPS this next year will not be produced on a CD, but made available as a Permanent Digital Download to registered members of ATSSB. He reported that the State Board had approved sponsoring a clinic at TBA tentatively titled Maintaining Success In A Small-School Band Program When The Director Retires Or Leaves, using Rob Toups and Mike Bartley as panelists. He thanked the Association for his two years of service as President and received a round of applause.

Under the reports of **Special Committees**:

Mike Bartley introduced **Gabe Musella** who gave a UIL report:

No Pass / No Play rule update coming mid-March from TEA, already approved and awaiting final approval from the Commissioner of Education. Local ISDs will decide whether to implement or not.

TSSEC takes entries beginning March 1 and ending April 1 with six choices: June 1-2-3, Saturday AM, Saturday PM, Sunday AM, Sunday PM, Monday AM, or Monday PM.

Solos and ensembles are under review (Class I this year, Class II next year, etc.) with middle school, high school assistants and ATSSB members included on Class II and III panels.

The 2018-19 PML Committee has completed its work, adding one Grade 1, six Grade 2, three Grade 3, seven Grade 4, and six Grade 5.

The State Mariachi Festival will take place next week and is no longer a pilot program.

The TMAA Sightreading Study Committee under Chair Greg Countryman is studying revision of the sightreading process and will have a report soon.

The State Marching Contest is scheduled for November 4-6t for 1A, 3A and 5A.

August 1 physical exams are due for 1st and 3rd year participants. An FAQ page on the UIL website will help with questions regarding these required physicals.

Other issues are under study by various committees.

The **Website Report** was given by Marc Nichelson:

The new website should be up and running prior to TBA this summer. The person designing the web site has prepared a 20-minute video about it which will be sent to State Board members after TMEA so they can take a look at it for a better understanding of how the site will look and operate. Mr. Nichelson asked the Board to send him what they used the most on the current site so he could make sure those were prioritized and easily accessible on the new site. He will have the capability using an app to help anyone navigate or create changes on their web pages with them called Teamviewer.

Color Instrument Recorded Audition Committee report:

Chair Asa Burk reported that the committee concluded that while it could be done, it would be too resource-intensive and impractical due to time constraints and the committee recommends that there be no more action taken.

Heard reports of **Standing Committees**:

President-Elect and **SARC Chair** Eric Gray presented motions from the committee:

Timpani tuning will be done using a keyboard instrument in the audition room. Second by Jason Jones. After a discussion regarding the need to keep electronic equipment out of the audition room but still allowing the use of a pitch pipe, the question was called and the motion failed. Trent Graves moved that timpani tuning be done using a non-electronic source. Second by Mike Glaze. Motion passed.

Add to **errata** Year C Trombone Andante effettuoso: 4th measure of 4th line, 4th note should be D#. Second by Kenneth Griffin. Motion carried.

Authorize the **State Jazz Coordinator** to amend the Jazz Audition Instruction page to be year specific so more specific instructions can be conveyed to students about each year's audition material. Second by Marc Nichelson. Motion Carried.

Change the 20-second **warmup** at State Chair Auditions to be 30 seconds to align with region audition procedures. Second by Angie Liss. Motion carried.

Ann Lowes Mueller, Coordinator of the **Composition Competition**, noted that she had no report, had not yet received any compositions, but was looking forward to the competition.

Mike Bartley reported on behalf of the Past-President Committee that he would like to present a **clinic at TBA** regarding how to maintain a successful band program after the director leaves (retirement, another position, etc.). He would ask Rob Toups to join him in presenting the clinic. Motion by committee, second by Matt. Knight. Motion carried.

Collin Anderson, **OPS State Chair**, noted that the Verification Form was being updated, the entry deadline was moving to May 25 with Area certification June 8 and State certification June 20. He noted that it was the Designated Region and Designated Area Coordinator duty to select capable judges for each level of adjudication. He reminded Coordinators that they were not to release results to the public – the only official public announcement of results will come from his office (several regions released results that had errors and had to be corrected and rereleased). Coordinators may calculate results if they want to see them but must not release them or post them in any way. A discussion regarding the involvement of non-varsity bands is ongoing and the OPS Steering Committee will report its recommendations at TBA. He reported that we are moving away from compact discs and that the OPS winners will be available as a Permanent Digital Download beginning this year (a CD will not be produced and physically mailed with the September Newsletter).

State Jazz Coordinator Brian Donnell thanked the Region and Area Coordinators for their efforts to make the digital jazz area adjudications go so smoothly this past fall. He noted that this next year will be SET D. Buddy Mattei will have the accompaniment CDs ready for sale by March 1 and will have the Region/Area audition accompaniment CD ready for distribution at TBA. The vibes requirement has been removed and brushes added. There is no new music, but the accompaniment for year D has changed, so it would be good to get a new CD.

President's Report by Mike Bartley:

Mr. Bartley thanked everyone for his two years in office, how much he had enjoyed the term and his work with all involved in the processes we support. He encouraged everyone to attend band rehearsals, that he was pleased with what he saw and heard in his visits. He wanted everyone to be sure to attend all the small-school Honor Band concerts this year and the Friday General Session where state officers would be elected and a Constitutional Amendment regarding voting would be considered.

Executive Secretary's Report by Kenneth Griffin:

He reminded Region Coordinators to be careful to check that the head director of the school entering region auditions is a current Active Member of ATSSB. He asked that regions still owing for region patches (1, 4) to please get accounts current.

Gave a **Scholarship Report** which showed a value of \$132,855.83 as of January 1, 2019, noting that 445 individuals have been awarded ATSSB Scholarships since 1995 (not all were claimed) and that we still lack paying four \$500 scholarships (that will lapse February 17, 2019), that we are awarding \$26,000 in scholarships this year to 24 3-year (\$500 each) and seven 4-year (\$2000 each). Noted that the Kenner Scholarship Fund was valued at \$12,515.92 as of January 1, 2019, and that \$1000 would be used for the 2019 Kenner Scholarship to be awarded at the General Session on Friday. The Program Fund was valued at \$21,154.10 as of January 1, 2019 and that dividends from that fund have consistently paid for all-state programs since the fund was started with a donation from the Elmer and Anita Family Trust.

Motion carried. Mr. Bartley asked OPS State Chair Collin Anderson to include that in communications with judges he contacts for that event.

A motion by Region 15 Coordinator and seconded by Elissa Rodriguez to change the **one-breath warmup** to a one-note warmup failed.

Kenneth Griffin moved and Eric Gray seconded that the State Board make the motion in the General Session to approve the **Constitutional Amendment** regarding the election of a President-elect after a vacancy occurs. Motion carried.
